New Research on Collective Impact




- Published earlier this year from Spark Policy Institute and ORS Impact, the research study When Collective Impact Has an Impact examines the question:

Milestone

Lafayette removed from state list of waters impaired for bacteria by 20+ partners



Milestone Expected Oct. 2018

 Lafayette to become first VA river fully restored for oyster habitat







Milestone - 36 M lbs of contamination removed (7 industries, EPA worked together)






River Star Businesses

125 businesses have voluntarily reduced pollution by 334 M lbs since 1997

Polarized to pulling together: 3 secrets



1) Hire the best professional facilitator you can find.

Expertise needed to find "win-win"
