





### **Six Conditions of Systems Change**





Life Expectancy




#### Lack of Physical Activity





# Tobacco Use Data Source: Behavioral










Create greater health, social, economic and racial equity in King County so that all people thrive and prosper, regardless of race or place. GUIDING PRINCIPLES

- Consistently demonstrate the values of equity, respect and partnership.
- Ensure low-income communities and communities of color affected by inequities Advocate for and change institutional policies and processes to support equity goals.
- Encourage investments (both funding and in-kind resources) in long-term community capacity building and in systems, policy and practice changes that lead to greater racial
- Catalyze alignment of funding streams and partner across issues and sectors to seek
- Be transparent and show how data and community expertise inform initiative strategies.
- Continuously learn, improve and share work publicly.
- Focus on geographic communities with the greatest needs, while simultaneously sharing lessons learned and building relationships across King County – We are one King County.

disparities in health and well-being


