

Developing the Guide

- Experience: 20 years of experience supporting place-based collaboratives and community organizations
- Evolving collaboration practice: Collective impact framework informed what it takes to get to change at scale
- Frustration: Identified the need to build sustainability from the start
- Intention and focus: Propose a set of factors which influence the success
- Input & expertise: Research, advisory group, community storytellers







Communities Building Youth Futures

Developed as part of the Communities Building Youth Futures (CBFY) initiative specifically to support 20 communities in determining how to build sustainable collaborations but made it open and accessible to all collaborations.

Sustainability and Resilience

Sustainability incorporates many factors, including leadership, funding, community engagement, and the ability to influence policy and systems that lead to a program or a collective impact. Whereas resilience focuses on the internal conditions related to collaborative health and well-being, sustainability includes investments and outcomes that can have lasting impacts. These concepts are tied together and can affect one another.



Sustainability Factors

People Factors

- Equity and inclusion embedded in design
- 2 Strong ties between partners
- Broad community engagement

Resource Factors

- Adequate human and financial resources
- Partners contribute to shared outcomes

Process Factors

- Compelling Case drives work
- Ongoing reflection and learning

Impact Factors

- Data and Evidence informs approach
- Progress and Impact is tracked and reported
- Influence policy and systems change



Resilience Practices

Build from top and bottom

6 Leverage existing assets

Nurture caring relationships

Develop "good enough" plans

Adapt to change

Be purpose- and values-focused

- Build partner capacity

- Examples: Calgary Reads, Food First NL








The Promise Partnership of Utah

An infrastructure designed for sustainability, and a core set of predictable backbone practices as the bedrock of resiliency.

- Stop: chronic absence network
- Transition: afterschool/school linked database
- Continue: fight for academic outcomes in preschool





Resiliency Core

- Shared Promise Partnership identity
- · Constant communication
- Predictable cadences
- Standard enough planning and reporting tools

Sustainability Self Assessment Tool



TOOL | SUSTAINABILITY SELF-ASSESSMENT

Developing a sustainable collaborative can be challenging. The sustainability self-assessment tool helps collaborations to consider 10 factors and assess the degree to which the partners are engaged in building sustainability into their effort. It is also important to note that not all collaborations or the outcomes of the collaboration should be sustained. In some cases, when the collaboration has achieved its core purpose, it should consider how to wrap up its work.

Sustainability is about many factors including leadership, funding, community engagement, and the ability to influence policy and systems that lead to program or collective impact. Sustainability includes investments and outcomes that can have lasting impact.

Successful and sustainable collaborations are ones where every actor in a partnership has a role to play and where responsibility for ensuring the sustainability of their collaborative efforts is shared. This includes conveners, backbone partners, community members, and partners who are engaged from different sectors. To achieve longer term sustainability, all partners can and should play a part.

The 10 Factors for creating Collaboration Sustainability

The 10: A Guide for Building a Sustainable and Resilient Collaborative identified ten sustainability factors. These factors focus on the people, process, resources, and impact of the collaboration's efforts. The people factors focus on embedding equity in the design, strong ties between partners, partners contribute to shared outcomes, adequate human resources, and broad community engagement.


The process factors focus on creating a compelling case, the use of data and evidence to inform the approach, and ongoing reflection and learning. The resource factors focus on ensuring adequate human and financial resources and the contributions of partners. The impact factors include tracking progress, and influencing policy and systems change.

Sustainable collaboration processes pay attention to these 10 factors in their design and collective effort. In
