




What Is Systems Change?

Systems change is about shifting the conditions that are holding a problem in place

Shifting the Conditions That Hold the Problem In Place

Six Conditions of Systems Change







System entrepreneurs are typically playing one or several roles required to shift conditions that hold a problem in place

System Entrepreneur Roles

- Orchestrator: Facilitates alignment towards common goals and coordinates action across groups, organizations and sectors
- Innovator: Creates new, actionable solution(s) to address dysfunctions in the system
- Agitator: Creates visibility into system dysfunction and/or raises grievances of individuals or groups to the forefront of public awareness.




We Have Established Six Key System Entrepreneur Criteria to Guide Selection

Priority System Entrepreneur Selection Criteria

- Has or creates *proximity* to the people and the problem they are addressing
- Engages with *individuals most affected by the problem as* assets (possessing talents, skills, and expertise) in developing solutions
- Views and embodies *collective leadership* as a critical component in achieving systems change
- Focuses on shifting *multiple* interrelated systemic conditions
- Is **system aware** understands relationships and power dynamics between players in the system
- Addresses the deeper, transformative levers of systems **change** (e.g., power dynamics, relationships, and narratives) in addition to structural levers (e.g., practices, policies, and resource flows)
